Food Safety Training for 4-H Clubs

Does your club have fundraisers that involve food: bake sales, spaghetti dinners, taco booth? Do you ever have a potluck dinner or buyer's dinner or camp out? If yes, you need to have a club representative attend the Food Safety for 4-H Clubs training on **Saturday, November** 1 at 10:00 AM at the Montague School during Officer Training. This would be a great opportunity for training for teen and jr. leaders and leaders of the food projects.

4-H Fundraising

All 4-H units, including clubs and projects, must submit a plan to the 4-H Office before doing any fundraising in the name of 4-H. Questions that you need to answer in the plan include; Does the fundraising effort support the educational goals of 4-H? Why are you raising the funds? How will you recognize those who support you? The 4-H Office has copies of fundraising forms that can be picked up for your use. 4-H staff is recording the information, to avoid duplication and to assure fiscal responsibility.

National 4-H Week Poster Contest

The posters that were created for National 4-H Week showed a great deal of creativity. I hope that all the posters were displayed at schools or in local businesses so that others could see what 4-H is about, from the view of members that are currently enrolled. Volunteer Leader Orientation

The 4-H Youth Development Program of the University of California is committed to providing a safe environment for young people involved in Cooperative Extension activities. Through standardized procedures for the appointment of volunteers, appropriate screening, selection and placement is conducted for volunteers in the 4-H Youth Development Program. New leaders must complete an enrollment form, pay fees to a community club, be fingerprinted through the Cooperative Extension Office or live scanned through the Siskiyou County Sheriff's Department along with attending leader orientation. Only certified 4-H volunteer leader's whose prints have cleared, are covered under the University of California liability insurance. Leader orientation dates are:

- Tuesday, November 4, 2003 6:30 p.m. at the 4-H Office
- Thursday, November 20, 2003 6:30 p.m. at the 4-H Office

Jr./Teen Leader Qualifications

Junior Leaders- Available to youth in grades $6^{\text{th}}-8^{\text{th}}$, or if home schooled, must be at least 11 yrs and no more than 13 yrs as of January 1 of the program year. This new policy gives 6^{th} grade youth an opportunity to begin using their leadership skills.



Teen Leaders- Available to youth 9th-12th grades, or if home schooled, must be at least 14 yrs, as of January 1st of the program year. This change allows 9th grade youth to become Teen Leaders. All Jr. and Teen Leaders are responsible for filling out the Leadership Plan and Report in order to receive credit as a Jr./Teen Leader.

Citizenship Focus Trips

Information about the California Citizenship Focus Program will be arriving in county offices the week of October 13. Check it out.
